Local Authority EHE support	Local authorities in England support home-educated learners mainly by offering information, guidance, optional advisory contact, clarity on legal responsibilities, signposting local groups and exam centres, and they may offer voluntary meetings with Elective Home Education (EHE) advisors to review provision or offer advice. For children with EHCPs, LAs must continue to maintain the plan and deliver any therapies or provision specified in Section F. Some LAs also help with post-16 transitions, SEND processes and access to services like libraries or youth activities, though the level of support varies widely. They do not provide curriculum materials, tutors, or routine monitoring unless there are concerns about suitability.							
Private Tutors	Parents can use private tutors by bringing in targeted, flexible expertise that complements the learning happening at home. Tutors can provide subject-specific teaching (such as maths, English, science, languages or GCSE/A-level preparation), help fill gaps in knowledge, or offer structured							Prices vary



	<p>lessons for children who benefit from predictable routines. Many families use tutors to support SEND needs, offering low-demand, one-to-one teaching that can be paced around a child’s energy, interests or regulation. Tutors can work in person or online, deliver regular weekly sessions or short-term booster blocks, and help with exam preparation, portfolios, or project-based learning.</p>	
Local groups	<p>Families can find information about local groups supporting home-educated learners through several reliable routes. Most start with their local authority’s Elective Home Education (EHE) webpage, which usually lists nearby meet-ups, exam centres and community organisations. Many families also use local Facebook or local WhatsApp groups, which are often the most active places for arranging park meet-ups, co-ops, workshops and SEND-friendly sessions. Community hubs such as libraries, leisure centres, museums and youth services frequently host home-ed sessions and advertise them on their websites or noticeboards. National organisations like Education Otherwise, Home Education Advisory Service (HEAS) and Home Education UK maintain directories or signposting pages that link to regional groups.</p>
